Ponderings in the Pasture - Pastor Gutz

And great was the fall of it." Matthew 7:27

This is Jesus' description of the house that was built on sand. This is also a description of a life that's built on a foundation other than His Word. Those who build houses like that often believe they're building on solid ground. They stick to stark reality. They know what counts in this world - money, money, and more money - so they lay a solid ground of real assets. Their lives rest on that ground. They definitely haven't built any castles in the sand.

Yet this house will fall, and the fall will be great. Some of these houses fall apart during the owner's lifetime. Some of the houses stand year after year and everything would've gone as planned, if it were only a question of economy. However this passage is about a different kind of building, building a life, something that we received from God and will someday give back. *That's* the building that helplessly falls apart if you *hear* but don't *do*, or do neither one.

The rain fell, as Jesus tells us. It can really rain in Palestine. Wide and muddy rivers stream down the mountainsides, dragging gravel and dirt and throwing itself like a foaming river at everything that comes in its way. At times like these it's not safe and snug to be sitting inside a house and listening to the rain patter on the roof. Instead, anxious questions come. Is the wall going to cave in? Will the roof fall down on us?

That is the kind of house we're living in. You can try to pretend that it isn't so. You've taken care of your money, but the years go by and you can't help noticing that there are cracks in the house. You try to fix it. It works for a while with cosmetics, dying your hair, rejuvenating shots, and occupational therapy. Then, however, comes the tidal wave. Death makes its mark on the house. The poor soul crawls into a corner and refuses to believe that

it's finally over. The end comes, however, and yet it's not really over. A naked, wretched soul wanders toward the final reckoning. Here he meets another river more powerful than any other. It's the river of eternity "whose streams make glad the city of God" (Psalm 46:4). Now another storm is raging, the breath from the four winds that breathes upon these slain, that they may live (Ezekiel 37:9).

Everything that doesn't belong to Christ is swept away. However, everything that is born of the Spirit will rise up and sing and rejoice in the coming of the Lord. It turns out there's a dwelling place that isn't made by hand, a building that comes from God. It rests on the Rock, Jesus, and not even the gates of hell are too much for it.

"Oh, guard my soul, and deliver me! Let me not be put to shame, for I take refuge in you." (Psalm 25:20 ESV)

"In you, O LORD, do I take refuge; let me never be put to shame; in your righteousness deliver me! Incline your ear to me; rescue me speedily! Be a rock of refuge for me, a strong fortress to save me!" (Psalm 31:1-2 ESV)

Educate your children

If you prefer school, sports, and other activities (which may be perfectly fine in and by themselves) over what is Christian-the Church service, Divine Liturgy, Lord's Supper- then you have lost your battle already. Do not expect that if the real trouble comes, you would be firm to endure.

Instruct your children at the earliest time possible before the world grabs them through increasingly sophisticated ways of mind control.

Christian education must be done within families. You can't just expect the pastor to do everything for you. Regular church attendance, reading of Scripture, singing hymns, praying, doing works of mercy are always good.

HEALTH MINISTRIES

Genesis 1:9 And God said, "Let the waters under the heavens be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. (ESV)

Dear Friends in Christ,

Our blood pressure clinics are going well. Thank you so much for participating and allowing me to serve you. In noticing that a few blood pressures are on the low side (you know who you are), I thought this month we might talk about water. Growing up in Minnesota, water is one of my favorite things, but we'll save fishing for a different day!

On average, 60 percent of our bodies consist of water. Every system in your body depends on water. For example, water flushes toxins out of vital organs, carries nutrients to your cells and provides a moist environment for ear, nose and throat tissues. We lose the water in our systems through perspiration, breathing (yes, breathing), and other bodily functions. Lack of water can lead to dehydration, a condition that occurs when you don't have enough water in your body to carry out normal functions. Even mild dehydration can drain your energy and make you tired. (Mayo Clinic, 2014) We generally use the "8 by 8" rule to replenish the water our bodies need—8 eight ounce glasses of water per day. Keep in mind that specific disease processes (e.g., congestive heart failure, kidney failure) may limit the amount of fluid that can be taken in safely while protecting your heart. We will definitely discuss these topics in the future.

There can be problems with taking in enough water. Remember, fluid isn't necessarily a glass of water. For example, some people do not like water. My gramma would NEVER drink water. She used to say, "water is what you wash your feet with!" Remember, water is in other things--fruit, Jell-O, Kool aid, flavored water, broth (soup), juice, ice, sherbet. If you do not like "water," think of something you do like. For example for low-calorie flavor, add slices of your

favorite fruits such as melon, oranges, berries or even cucumber or mint to a pitcher of water and refrigerate for two hours (it's really good). Also, as we age, some of us lose the sensation of thirst. We just do not feel thirsty. You may have to trick yourself. Carry a glass, thermos, or bottle of your favorite beverage with you. Make it a habit to have it with you like your purse or wallet. If it is near, you will be more likely to take a drink now and then. A good trick--keep a glass of water next to you while you are watching television and start taking a drink during the commercials. It will soon become a habit.

What a wonderful pleasure it is to serve as your parish nurse. It has been about 24 vears (I know, we're still "newbies") since I and my family joined Holy Trinity. Twenty-four years of raising children, working, going to school, getting the children through school, getting the children (and the husband) through confirmation, weddings, grandbabies, baptisms...all the blessings He gives us as part of our lives here. All this time we have known each other, but now, through this program, I have been given the gift of getting to know you through our health ministry. Romans 1:12 That is, that we may be mutually encouraged by each other's faith, both yours and mine. (ESV)

Our blood pressure clinics for August will be the 3rd and 17th. Hope to see you there.

What do you do when persecution strikes?

- 1) The devil is behind all and every persecution. Accordingly, our fight is not with flesh and blood. It must be thought of in spiritual categories. "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68). Abide with the Lord and His gifts by all means possible. Come to church where His gifts are administered.
- 2) When a non-Christian government targets the Church for an attack, it may (among other things) attempt to infiltrate the Church to bring another gospel and so change a church body from inside. Have your ears open to hear the true voice of your Shepherd. Be nurtured in Scripture and the confessions of the Church so that you may "test the spirits" (1 John 4:1).
- 3) Make sure you know at least some Scripture verses by heart. It will help you pray and find consolation if you are left alone and have no Bible around. Also, remember the stories of those who served as an example in faith, both in ancient and recent times.
- 4) Pray. Christ hated sin, but He loved sinners. At the time of death, He prayed for His executioners (Luke 23:34), and the first Christian martyr, Stephen, did likewise (Acts 7:60).
- 5) Do not trust the promises and reassurances of people who are enemies of the faith. Satan is the cause of persecution, and Satan is a liar. We should do our best to show our non-believing neighbors that Christians are loving and kind, but it would not hurt remembering that Christians will never come out right in the eyes of the world anyway.
- 6) Think about relocation. I do hope that it will never become such a situation in the United States that Christians will have to move to preserve their faith, but we must never exclude any possibilities. Be flexible. It is better to be in a place where you have freedom of worship even when it results in deterioration of your social status and economic prosperity.
