Ponderings in the Pasture - Pastor Gutz

The following article is taken from <u>To Live</u> <u>With Christ</u> devotions by Bo Giertz, CPH, 2008, p.81-82.

"Today, if you hear His voice, do not harden your hearts." Hebrews 3:7

You can harden your heart, the author of Hebrews says. He must have seen frightening examples of that kind of hardening. He comes back to this several times and emphasizes that it can go on for so long that you will no longer be able to return and receive forgiveness. God comes to meet us. He longs after His children. He sends invitations to us and prays we will feel welcomed at His house. He never did it so consciously and with so much affection as when He sent His Son into the world. It's not easy to say no to Him, but it's possible. There is something called "an evil unbelieving heart" (Hebrews 3:12). Even if you've been able to see and experience all God has to give in the way of forgiveness and mercy, you can still tear yourself away and "fall away from the living God" (Hebrews 3:12). But this doesn't happen unless you harden your heart. You can make your heart so hard that it is frozen solid. Then you have become hardened and nothing more can help you. Hebrews says about men like these that it's impossible to come back to repentance. Jesus warned people like this about the sin against the Holy Spirit. They were people who had been allowed to see all of His good deeds. They couldn't deny His miracles, but they said; "He is possessed by Beelzebul" (Mark 3:22).

This was clear to the original Christians. God had done His best. After sacrificing His own Son, He could do no more. If they still didn't want to receive, it was hopeless. We find that there was an example of this in old Israel too. The generation that was brought out of Egypt and saw God's enormous deeds but still fell to temptation in the desert was not allowed into the Promised Land.

The reason was obvious - they were unable to enter because of unbelief: "In spite of this word you did not believe the LORD your God" (Deuteronomy 1:32). It's the same way with us. If we can't enter heaven, it's because of our unbelief. There isn't any great sin that can't be forgiven. Jesus made it possible. But no one enters without forgiveness.

Help us Lord, never to harden our hearts when You speak. If we try, let Your voice speak even louder. Let there be a fire therein that burns us. Give us no peace and no tranquility. Let us know that we are wandering in the dark and soon will no longer be with You. Have mercy on us all, on our parish, and on our people. You have every reason to be tired of us. You Yourself have said that You will chop down a tree that does not bear fruit. But You also prayed often for the tree that bears no fruit. Therefore, we ask You for another year and for the understanding to cherish it. For that, we need Your grace and Your help, Lord. Give it to us for Your mercy's sake.

Jacqueline Girard, RN, MSN, PN Dear Friends in Christ,

1 Timothy 4:14-16, "Do not neglect the gift you have, which was given you by prophecy when the council of elders laid their hands on you. Practice these things, immerse yourself in them, so that all may see your progress. Keep a close watch on yourself and on the teaching. Persist in this, for by so doing you will save both yourself and your hearers." (ESV) Paul, in his letters, provided encouragement to Timothy. January is Cervical Health Awareness Month, and I would provide encouragement to the women in our congregation. Encouragement to "keep a close watch on yourself."

We have an innate predisposition to care for others; but, in doing so, tend to neglect ourselves. "Cervical Health Awareness Month is a chance to raise awareness about how women can protect themselves from HPV (human papillomavirus) and cervical cancer. HPV is...also a major cause of cervical cancer...Cervical cancer screenings can help detect abnormal (changed) cells early, before they turn into cancer. Most deaths from cervical cancer could be prevented by Pap tests and follow-up care" (The National Cervical Cancer Coalition). "Cervical cancer is the easiest gynecological cancer to prevent with regular screening tests and vaccination. It is also very curable when found and treated early" (Womenshealth.gov). Please make and keep regular appointments with your health providers. In many cases, an ounce of prevention really is worth a pound of cure.

Also, please know that you are noticed, appreciated, and loved. While you care for others, others (including our Father) care about you. Proverbs 3:15-18 "She is more precious than jewels, and nothing you desire can compare with her. Long life is in her right hand; in her left hand are riches and honor. Her ways are ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace. She is a tree of life to those who lay hold of her; those who hold her fast are called blessed." (ESV)

5 Resolutions Every Lutheran Should Keep

Today is not for reminiscing about what would/could/should have been. It is, after all, a new year, full of hopes, dreams and new beginnings.

So in the Spirit of the New Year, let's look at five resolutions every Lutheran should keep in 2016 (and beyond):

1) Remember Your Baptism.

It makes sense to start at the very foundation of our new life in Christ. Take this new year to remember that you're a new you on account of your Baptism into Christ. It was done at God's command and with His Word. You now have forgiveness life and salvation! Rejoice in this "washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior" (Titus 3:5-6).

Do you still regret something from the past year or from long ago? Baptism now saves you! So drown and bury that guilt along with all your sins and evil desires and look "to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith" (Heb. 12:2).

2) Go to church regularly and receive Christ's body and blood.

This seems obvious so why mention it? Attending church. Hearing God's Word and receiving Christ's body and blood. We know it's good for us, and yet we're quick to make excuses and do other things that either serve to starve our faith or feed it such rubbish that it suffers instead of strengthens. Jesus gives His very body and blood, given and shed for you as a testament. To look for Jesus outside these means of grace is foolish. But isn't the Church just full of sinners? Of course it is! That's the point. We shouldn't be surprised when sinners gather in the place where forgiveness is promised.

3) Support your pastor and the work of your congregation.

It's true: Your pastor's a sinner too. It's also true that he's the sinner whom God called to publicly proclaim His Word and

administer His Sacraments in that place. There's an obvious financial obligation that Christians have to support the under-shepherd whom God has given for "The laborer deserves his wages" (I Tim. 5:18).

There are other ways to support your pastor. Cards and notes are appreciated. Pray for him. We all have God- given skills and talents that can be exercised as we care and love each other.

4) Encourage the families of your church.

Families here mean everyone from singles to single parents, from the widowed and orphaned to the traditional family. No one is left out. We should live in a constant state of forgiving one another and directing each other to Word and Sacrament, "not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Heb. 10:25).

5) Make a bold confession.

Of all the resolutions on this list, this one might scare you the most. Yet it is also a privilege to confess Christ in our various callings in life. To be clear, this doesn't mean that you should stand on the street corner and thump your Bible. It does mean, however that there are many opportunities to share the hope that lies within us on a daily basis.

Perhaps your waitress expresses a burden that she's bearing. Jesus says, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest" (Matt. 11:28). Or your spouse feels like he or she has been cut off from God's (or your) love. St. Paul says, "For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers... nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us form the love of god in Christ Jesus our Lord" (2 Cor. 12:10). The confession, however weak, is bold on account of Christ.

There will be times when we slip and fall short in keeping these resolutions or neglect them, yet do not lose heart. Jesus loves you and forgives you!
