## **Ponderings in the Pasture - Pastor Gutz**

### **A Good Example of Disillusionment**

The story is “Young Goodman Brown” by Nathaniel Hawthorne. In the story, set in colonial Salem, the character for whom the story is named goes for a walk in the woods only to discover his fellow townspeople engaging in what appears to be a Satanic ritual. These are people Goodman Brown knows by day as morally upstanding, church-going folk.

The climactic moment in the story is Brown’s discovery that his very own wife, Faith, is also present as a new “convert” to the evil fellowship that has convened. He screams at her to “Look up to heaven, and resist the wicked one!” After that, the scene jumps to Brown’s return to the village the following morning. Had it all been a dream?

Ultimately that matters little, since Brown was from that time on “a stern, a sad, a darkly meditative, a distrustful, if not a desperate man” who “when he had lived long, and was borne to his grave” had “no hopeful verse upon his tombstone; for his dying hour was gloom.”

Ultimately, he discovers not only Faith but his minister and former Sunday school teacher at the gathering in the woods. No wonder his “dying hour was gloom.” Everyone he believed in shows themselves to be something other than what he thought. What does someone do with a discovery like that?

#### **Four Things to Remember**

1. People are a mess. That means everything they touch is a mess: families, churches, governments, and nations. It’s always been that way and will always be that way. Thank God we don’t put our ultimate hope in sinful humanity and its various institutions but in the one who created the world and all its inhabitants, who loves the world He created more than we can possibly

imagine, and who therefore made and carried out a plan for its redemption. His love and truth dwarf all our little messes.

2. Because people are a mess, they are going to let you down. Even the people you look up to most—parents, teachers, pastors, close friends—will let you down. When this happens, it doesn’t erase the things those people taught you. If you catch the parent who taught you not to use foul language dropping the f-bomb, it doesn’t make him a hypocrite—it just makes him a fallible human being. If the pastor who taught you the faith turns out to be a liar in his personal life, it doesn’t erase the truth that he taught you about God. Principles stand independent of people, and the failure of those people to perfectly carry them out does not nullify them.

3. If you decide, based on a betrayal, to become cynical and untrusting, you will ultimately hurt yourself more than anyone else. Yes, trusting and believing in another means opening yourself up to another betrayal, another hurt, another let-down. But it also opens you up to future good. If you give up on everyone because one person has disappointed, you guarantee for yourself a lifetime of disappointment.

4. The people who really, really matter will always be there for you. Unfortunately, they, too, may let you down in ways big and small because they, too, are sinful humans. But you will know your importance to them when they come to you and humbly lay their failure at your feet and ask you for your forgiveness. When they do that, forgive them. They’re struggling through this life, trying to make sense of it just like you are. Have compassion for them, and be kind.

We do well, always, to remember that in this life each of us is constantly tempted to compromise, for the sake of ease or expedience, those principles we claim to hold dear. When we fail, and when those we look up to fail, let us not lose faith in what remains true or in the God who made all truth. Instead, let us cling to our Faith even more tightly, and pray for each other as we head out into the wilderness.

### **Pray for All People**

First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior, who desires all people to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

1 Timothy 2:1-4

## How Much Should I Give? What does God's Word Say?

God's Word helps us with these practical questions. St. Paul writes, "*On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as each one of you may prosper.*" (1 Corinthians 16:2 ESV)

And "*Each one must give as he has decided in his heart, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. And God is able to make all grace abound to you, so that having all sufficiency in all things at all times, you may abound in every good work. As it is written, "He has distributed freely, he has given to the poor; his righteousness endures forever."*

*He who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will supply and multiply your seed for sowing and increase the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way to be generous in every way, which through us will produce thanksgiving to God.* (2 Corinthians 9:7-11 ESV)

These verses give us 4 guidelines for Christian giving:

**1. Voluntarily and Cheerfully.** Giving is to be done voluntarily, not under compulsion, and cheerfully, not grudgingly.

**2. First Fruits.** Giving should be from the first fruits of our labor. Our giving is what we do on the *first* day of the week before our other expenses come due.

**3. Proportionally.** Giving is to be proportional, "as each one of you may prosper." Giving is not to be an arbitrarily, but rather is to be in accordance with how God has prospered us. Each of us should intentionally determine to set aside a certain proportion (percentage) of our income for Christ's Church each week.

**4. Faithfully.** God graciously promises to give us all that we need for this body and life. Therefore, we should give in faith, trusting that God will provide for all our needs – though not necessarily our wants! After all, if we can trust the Lord with our eternal salvation, can we not trust Him to provide our daily bread?

***Faithfully Give a Voluntary, Generous First Fruits Proportion*** of your income.

- **Receive God's gifts.** If you have not been faithfully attending worship to hear God's Word, receive His forgiveness, and partake of His body and blood for the eternal benefit of your soul, then by all means repent and come receive the gifts of our Lord Jesus! God does not want your money – He wants you, all of you.

- **Consider what the Church does.** The Church is called to spread the Good News about Jesus Christ by preaching the Gospel to all who will hear it and administering the Sacraments to the faithful. You are a part of God's Church on earth. As you have been blessed by being a part of the Church, support it that it might be a blessing to others.

- **Examine yourself.** Consider what God says about supporting the work of the Church and examine your own giving. Are you: a) giving of your first fruits – that is, does your offering come out of your paycheck first, not just what's left over; b) giving voluntarily and cheerfully; c) giving systematically and proportionally in a generous way; d) relying on God's promise to provide for you? If not, then repent and trust in God's provision; for God gave the life of His Son on the cross to forgive you all your sins – He will certainly not abandon you in your physical needs. Trust His Word and heed it.

- **Decide on your proportion.** Consider what proportion of your income you will give faithfully, proportionally, generously, and cheerfully. Although the New Testament does not command a proportion, many Christians have used a tithe (10%) as a helpful guideline.

A guide that many Christians have found helpful: Give away 10% - Save 10% - Live off of 80%. It's simple. Work at keeping Jesus first and everything else falls in place.

# HOLY TRINITY HEALTH MINISTRIES

Dear Friends in Christ,

2 Corinthians 12:10, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong." (ESV) The first week of October is Mental Illness Awareness Week. The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) states "1 in 5 people will experience a mental health condition in their life" and "75% of all chronic mental health conditions begin by the age of 24." From my perspective as a health care provider, frequently, the stigma of mental illness can be worse than the disease itself.

One of my great aunts was truly one of the gentlest and kindest souls I have ever known, and schizophrenic. Her auditory and visual hallucinations happened to be children (interesting, as she never had children of her own). They would encourage her to cheat when we were playing cards, and she would scold them! It never occurred to my brother and I that there was something "wrong" with our aunt. She just saw and heard things we didn't. And it was okay, she was ours, and we loved her. She went through her illness at a time of less understanding and knowledge of mental illness (including her husband). When she would get better, her husband would quit buying her medication as "she doesn't need them anymore." Without her medication, the hallucinations would become overwhelming, and she would hide. Many times, my grandmother (her big sister) would have to go find her. The lack of understanding regarding medications and treatment resulted in a lifelong cycle of time at home and time at the state hospital.

Like many people with mental illness, our aunt isolated herself. As a farm wife during that time, it was easy to do. Awkward, uncomfortable, and uncertain, she rarely went into town. However, with us, the family that loved her for herself, she was funny, kind, and

relaxed. Whether due to lack of treatment, or fear of social interaction, many of our homeless population suffer from mental illness. "An estimated 26% of homeless adults staying in shelters live with serious mental illness and an estimated 46% live with severe mental illness and/or substance use disorders" (NAMI). If you, or someone you know, suffers from mental illness, please seek treatment. As with any disease, there are treatments available.

With any disease, including mental illness, remember the examples and teachings of Jesus in your interaction. Ephesians 4:1-3, "I therefore, a prisoner for the Lord, urge you to walk in a manner worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace." (ESV)

Our blood pressure clinics for October will be the 15<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>. I look forward to seeing you.
