### Ponderings in the Pasture - Pastor Gutz

## "I believe in . . . the resurrection of the body."

Our bodies die. Does death separate us from the love of God in Christ? No. Does it separate us from one another? Yes. Even though Christ has conquered death, it is the final enemy that Christ has yet to completely destroy when He comes again in glory. The Christian Gospel looks forward and proclaims that hope. All is done, but there is more coming! Christ has completed His work, but He's not finished yet. What is that hope? The Christian hope is that when Christ comes again He will bring about the complete redemption of His creation. The final victory over sin and all sickness, and death will be swallowed up in the victorious return of the King. Every New Testament writing, page after page, is occupied and focused on this hope. The Biblical hope is that the day is coming when God's name will once again be hallowed throughout the creation and sickness and death will be done away with.

That hope is in our Bible and we confess it in the creeds. But often that hope is obscured or maybe even forgotten about. When you ask a Christian, what their hope and goal is their answer will probably be, "Dying and going to heaven." Now that is certainly true and there's nothing wrong with that, but there's more. There is the hope and promise - the assurance of the resurrection and restoration of the body.

Most of us like this life. We like to eat and drink. There are things we enjoy doing. There are many things we take delight in. That is good. Indeed, that is what we were made for. God made human beings and put us in a world that He created to enjoy and live in the fullness of His creation. It is a great thing to be human. God did not want you to be an angel or He would have made you an angel. He made you to be who you are. Our problem is not that we are human. God doesn't do away with our humanness. Human beings were made in the image of God. That's one of the reasons we value life. Every life is precious. Every human being is a reminder to Satan of the true God. That is why Satan seeks to destroy human life at any and every stage. Satan seeks to destroy our human-ness - including our bodies.

Sin separates us from God and brings death. Death brings the destruction of the body, even for Christians. And though it may appear now that Satan has power over our bodies, God is the ruler of His creation. God will not permit Satan to have that power. So when our Lord comes again in His glory, there will be a physical, bodily resurrection. When Christ comes again you will be fully human. You will be given a new body, a glorified body, but it will be a body! A human body. God will bring about a new creation unaffected by the ravages of sin and death.

John writes about this, "And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, 'Now the dwelling of God is with men, and he will live with them. They will be his people, and God himself will be with them and be their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away." (Rev. 21:3-4)

The history of this world is leading up to that great day and we are to look forward to it! The Word of God proclaims it. Until that day we are to look to that hope. In the meantime how shall I think about my dear Christian friends and relatives whose bodies now sleep in the grave? They are resting from their labors. They are with Christ, at peace, waiting for the last day and the final victory of God. That is enough. But it is not all. That is not the final victory that awaits us in Christ.

Christ has fully and completely redeemed us through His death and resurrection. He has forgiven us so completely that we do not need to fear the incredible day of His return, but rather we can long for it as the day of His great restoration for us and for all creation. After all we confess as Christians have for centuries, "I believe in the resurrection of the body and the life everlasting . . . I look for the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come." Amen.

bolster the English language mission work going on in the city. We have previously been holding services twice a month, but we have added 5th Sundays now and are looking to expand further. In order to truly plant a congregation, consistency is key.
